Toddler injured after falling into rhino exhibit

MELBOURNE, Fla. — A toddler who was injured after stumbling into a rhino exhibit at a Florida zoo on New Year's Day is recovering, according to her fa-ther.

"Our daughter is in good care at Ar-nold Palmer Hospital and is doing well," he said in a release sent through the hospital. "My wife was also treated for her

pital. "My wife was also treated for her injury and has been released from the hospital. At this time, we ask for privacy as we focus on our daughter's recovery." The family was participating in a hands-on experience Tuesday at Brevard Zoo in which guests can get up close to white rhinos, petting them and brushing them by reaching between large steel noles.

The girl was small enough to fall backward between the poles, which stand about 11 inches apart, according to the

zoo's executive director, Keith Winsten.
The girl's father had been holding onto her at the time she fell and was able to
pull her back almost as soon as she went into the enclosure, Winsten said.

When that happened, one of the female white rhinos turned her head and her snout made contact with the girl.

Winsten said zoo officials do not believe

the rhino's horn hit the girl.

Zoo officials say the welfare of the animals was never compromised and the rhinos won't be punished.

Female white rhinos can reach
weights of 4,000 to 4,400 pounds. The
zoo is home to four rhinos, including a
5,200-pound male named Frankie, acording to the zoo's wabsite.

The girl and her mother were both transported to separate hospitals to be treated for injuries sustained in the incident. No information was released on how the mother was injured.

Winsten said the zoo has temporarily suspended all rhino encounters until safety policies can be reviewed to pre-vent such incidents. Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission officers were also at the scene Tuesday. The agency oversees zoo safety around the state

Winsten said this is the first such incident since the feature began in 2009

One of the orders issued late Tuesday, hours after his inauguration, likely will make it all but impossible for new lands to be identified and demarcated for indigence communities. Accessed for indigenous communities. Areas set aside for "Quilombolas," as descend-ants of former slaves are known, are also affected by the decision.

ry. Bolsonaro said last year that he also wants to annul land demarcation deci-sions made by previous administra-tions, but legal experts say recent Brazilian Supreme Court rulings could block such a move.

In removing LGBT concerns from the responsibilities of the human rights ministry, Bolsonaro has strongly criticized what he calls "gender-based ideology," saying it is a threat to Brazil's Christian values.

LGBT activist Symmy Larrat said she doesn't' expect reasonable treat-ment from Bolsonaro.

REQUEST FOR COMMENTS ON TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

THE BATTLE CREEK AREA TRANSPORTATION STUDY (BCATS) HEREBY GIVES NOTICE of opportunity for public involvement in the fourteenth amendment to its *Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)* for fiscal years (FYs) 2017-2020 (10/1/16–9/30/20), consisting of the following proposed actions:

- 1) Adding a 2019 project of the Michigan Dept of Transportation (MDOT) to reconstruct the railroad crossing surface at GTWRR across M-37 (Helmer Rd), between Avenue A and Upton Ave in Springfield. Total construction (CON) phase \$207,718, 90% Federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) Safety Highway Crossing Hazard Elimination (STRH), 10% State "M" funds Michigan Betterment;
- 2) Reducing the CON budget for a 2019 project of the Calhoun County Road Dept (CCRD) to install sign-mounted flashing beacons on existing stop signs at the intersections of East Ave at Roosevelt Ave, East Ave at Morgan Rd, and 6.5 Mile Rd at Golden Ave (G Drive N), by 34% due to lower estimated cost as a result of completing the work via Force Account, to total \$30,000. 90% Fed Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), 10% CCRD;
- 3) Adding MDOT's 2019 preliminary engineering (PE) and right-of-way (ROW), and 2020 CON of railroad crossing surface & safety improvements at GTWRR across I-94BL (Michigan Ave), east of Union & west of Gilbert, and across Kendall St, just north of I-94BL (Dickman Rd). Includes addition of right-turn lane on I-94BL westbound approach to Kendall. ROW \$15,000 100% State Michigan Railroad, PE \$28,000 and CON \$250,845, both 90% Fed STRH, 10% State "M";
- **4)** Adding PE and CON phases of a 2019 MDOT project at GTWRR across Kendall St, just north of I-94BL (Dickman Rd), to upgrade preemption circuitry to railroad crossing & traffic signals at adjacent Kendall St/Dickman Rd intersection (in conjunction with trunkline projects #3 above, other signal work, and 2020 major resurfacing of Dickman Rd). PE \$58,000 and CON \$262,000, both 90% Fed STRH, 10% State "M";
- 5) Adding reference to a 2019-2020 MDOT effort to satisfy Federal requirement to bring deficient Rest Areas and Welcome Centers into current ADA compliance. Work is statewide as needed, and includes both rest areas along I-94 in Calhoun County. Total statewide PE+CON budget \$2,310,750, 100% State 2019 General Fund; and
- 6) Modifying the City of Battle Creek's 2020 "Major Resurfacings" project by moving planned Main St work [from Mary St southward to south city limits, and from M-66 (Division St) southward to Hamblin Ave], to a separate project with total CON phase budget of \$225,000. Main St to be fully resurfaced, remaining segments in 2020 "Major Resurfacings" to be chipsealed with CON budget of \$491,771. Both projects funded 81.85% Fed STP Urban Local (STUL), 18.15% City of BC.

Discussion & action regarding the TIP amendment will be conducted at the regular meetings of BCATS' Technical Committee (Wednesday 1/9/19) and Policy Committee (Wednesday 1/23/19), beginning at 1:30 pm in the Council Chambers of Springfield City Hall at 601 Avenue A. Public comment is encouraged before or at those meetings; BCATS' regular meetings are open to the public. Comments will be accepted up to Policy Committee action on 1/23/19.
